
Southwestern Vermont Medical Center 2024 Community Health Needs Assessment



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Executive Summary of Findings

Southwestern Vermont Medical Care (SVMC) conducts a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) every three years to:

- Determine the most pressing healthcare needs of the communities served
- Gain insight into the drivers behind recurring priority health needs
- Develop a comprehensive, multi-year implementation plan to address the priority health needs

In 2024, the priority health needs identified were:



Community members face the most challenges with mental health, struggles with substance use, meeting basic needs, and difficulties affording and accessing health care. Similar priority health needs were found in the last 3 consecutive CHNAs of 2021, 2018, and 2015, indicating that these challenges have persisted for nearly a decade and reflect larger structural issues.

A community-wide survey gathered information related to health care experiences, perception of personal and community wellbeing, and suggestions for improvements to the community health landscape. Secondary data was utilized to contextualize and validate the information provided by community members. The CHNA process involved input from community members and leaders representing the broad interests of the communities SVMC serves. This included members from the Department of Health, local schools, and community groups with an understanding of medically underserved, low income, and minority populations in the region. Survey distribution did not exclude any populations with health disparities or groups at risk of not receiving adequate medical care because of being uninsured or underinsured or due to geographic language, financial or other barriers. The CHNA process identified the priority health needs for the 75,000 individuals living with Southwestern Vermont Medical Center's (SVMC) service area.

Mental Health Supports

Mental health conditions were consistently identified as an area of top concern in all methods used to gather community insight. Depression and anxiety impact large portions of the population SVMC serves, particularly youth and young adults.

Challenges with mental health can critically impact an individual's ability to make healthy choices, to financially support oneself, and to enjoy life. SVMC is fortunate to partner with many community organizations that provide world-class mental health supports, most notably United Counseling Service (UCS), the Bennington-area designated mental health agency. Continued collaboration with UCS and innovations in community and clinical settings will amplify SVMC's efforts to address mental health needs.

Substance Use Prevention, Harm Reduction, Treatment, and Recovery Resources

Substance use has had a wide-ranging impact on the health of individuals in SVMC's service area and was frequently cited as a concern. Use of tobacco, particularly electronic vaping among youth, is alarmingly prevalent, as is binge drinking. Opioid use continues to result in an increasing number of fatal and non-fatal overdoses, according to data from outside community partners. While opioid use disorder has drawn the majority of media attention in the past few years, alcohol use disorder is a more prevalent and persistent condition, one that continues to negatively impact the residents of SVMC's service area.

No single intervention can alleviate the suffering and mortality caused by substance use. Community-wide support is critical for success, as is a suite of interventions that include prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery supports. Prevention

efforts, in tandem with campaigns led by community partners, will primarily center upon the youth population. Harm reduction programming will seek to provide health supports for individuals, such as the establishment of a needed alcohol use disorder continuum of care.

Challenges Thriving

The divide between income and cost of living continues to grow, exacerbating economic hardship for all but the wealthiest. Bennington County is not exempt. As prices continue to rise while wages remain relatively stagnant or rise more slowly, more and more community members in SVMC's service area are experiencing challenges thriving.

Concerns surrounding affordable housing, food insecurity, cost of transportation, and social vulnerability were frequently reported in community health survey responses and secondary data. Difficulty finding adequate employment, rising costs of housing and daily essentials, the worsening effects of climate change, and cuts to social support programs all contribute to the creation of an environment in which it is incredibly difficult to thrive. The struggles now associated with daily life are not isolated problems, and contribute heavily to low mental health and problems with substance use.

Community-wide support and expanded capacity of social programs are essential to mitigate this growing crisis. SVMC is committed to advocating for these changes.

Accessibility of High-Quality and Convenient Care

Provision of exceptional care and comfort is intrinsic to SVMC's commitment and service to the community. Ensuring access to quality care for all people is at the heart of the hospital's mission, strategic plan, and population health efforts. Though much of an individual's health outcomes are determined outside of the clinical setting, connection to the health system and resources is paramount to detecting early signs of illness and maintaining good health, by connecting individuals to appropriate resources. Community members cited challenges securing a fast, convenient medical appointment as a top concern. Difficulties with transportation to care, whether by private, public, or Emergency Medical Services, were identified by numerous community participants.

Modification of practice processes and expansion of on-demand telehealth services could provide a more convenient care landscape.

Cost of Care

A wide range of survey respondents indicated that the cost of health care was frequently an obstacle to seeking and receiving care. The cost of care in the United States is significantly more than that in similar industrialized countries, such as Canada. The already high and persistently increasing costs of health care in the US have serious consequences for all. People are often forced to delay or skip medical care because of the cost, or take fewer medications and treatments, regardless of how sick they are.

Delaying or skipping health care procedures completely often results in worse outcomes and a higher chance of permanent disability or death. Even those with insurance face concerns about affording health care, as monthly premiums and out-of-pocket costs can bring high up-front costs.

Regardless of insurance status, rising health care costs can pose a major barrier to receiving health care, and is a growing problem that SVMC will need to address. As a major regional health center, SVMC is in a unique position to collaborate and reduce barriers posed by high health care costs.

Introduction

Section 501(r) of the Internal Revenue Code requires that nonprofit health systems and hospitals complete a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) on a three-year basis. While Southwestern Vermont Medical Center (SVMC) routinely assesses community health data in efforts to improve quality, affordability, the patient experience, and accessibility, the CHNA process is robust and comprehensive, allowing for a unique blend of community voices, expert opinions, and public health data to inform future action.

- The CHNA builds an "information foundation" for community health action and clinical
 quality improvement initiatives. This foundation enables SVMC to act with the goal of
 improving health, reducing health inequalities, and facilitating long and healthy lives for all.
- 2. The CHNA creates a flow of communication between community members and the hospital, building mutual trust.
- 3. The finished CHNA is publicly available for community members and organizations. The assessment and associated implementation plan can be leveraged to unite community-wide efforts to meet the most pressing and complex health needs in the region.

Previously, SVMC completed a CHNA in 2015, 2018, and 2021. Many of the health needs identified in these previous reports have remained persistent problems that were identified again in 2024. This pattern of continuing priority health needs points to the continued influence of structural obstacles and the necessary development of targeted initiatives.

While this document endeavors to be a source for public health data and community opinion, omissions are unintentional but unavoidable. As described in the Methodology section, careful efforts were made to include a diversity of voices and sources of data.

Geographically, this assessment reflects the most densely populated regions of SVMC's service area: Bennington County, VT, western Windham County, VT, eastern Rensselaer and Washington Counties, NY, and northern Berkshire County, MA, in which 75,000 individuals are served by SVMC. Results were developed using both quantitative data and qualitative methods, including multiple digital surveys, insight from subject matter experts, and secondary data.

Responses indicated struggles with mental health, substance use, meeting basic needs, and difficulties affording and accessing health care.

Though the needs identified in the assessment may seem complex, challenging, and intractable, SVMC is well positioned to develop innovative methods and programs to address community needs. In tandem with numerous community partners,



SVMC will continue to deliver innovative solutions that improve the health care landscape and support healthy people and communities.

Care Delivery Sites of SVMC

SVMC is part of the corporate family of Southwestern Vermont Health Care (SVHC) and Dartmouth Health, an integrated health system. The SVHC corporate family includes:

- Southwestern Vermont Medical Center, an acute care hospital
- SVMC ExpressCare, which provides walk-in appointments for non-emergency needs
- A medical office building with twenty specialty care practices
- Primary care practices in Manchester, Wilmington, and Pownal, VT, as well as Hoosick Falls, NY
- A seasonal clinic, Mountain Medical Services, at the base of Mount Snow in West Dover, VT
- An Urgent Care center in North Adams, MA
- A regional cancer center integrated with Dartmouth Cancer Center, one of only three National Cancer Institute-designated comprehensive cancer centers in New England
- The Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation in Hoosick Falls, NY


Through our integration with Dartmouth Health, and visionary partnerships with Castleton University and others, nearly 1,400 employees emulate the values of quality,

empathy, safety, teamwork, and stewardship to fulfill SVMC's mission of providing exceptional care and comfort for the 75,000 people they serve. SVMC's commitment to quality care has been recognized by the nation's most stringent regulators and the industry's leading professional organizations. SVMC has committed to a variety of projects and initiatives that will improve health and wellbeing at the community-level. A framework for understanding how SVMC's clinical initiatives align with community initiatives can be found within this Community Health Needs report.

Methodology

SVMC's Service Area:

SVMC's community of 75,000 people (referred to as SVMC's service area), spans many towns within five counties and three states. For the 2024 CHNA process, the defined area of SVMC's services remained consistent with previous years. SVMC's defined service area includes: Bennington County, Vermont, portions of Windham County, Vermont, Rutland County, Vermont, Eastern Washington and Rensselaer Counties in New York, and Northern Berkshire County, Massachusetts. Where used in this report, county level data represents the counties as a whole.



For the 2024 CHNA, SVMC's service area was defined by looking at the total number of SVMC patient "encounters" in fiscal year 2023. An encounter includes a patient utilizing any of SVMC's inpatient or outpatient services. Zip codes were included within SVMC's service area if they generated one patient encounter at an SVMC care site per three people in the zip code, during 2023. This method, though slightly complex, is far more reflective of SVMC's true patient population than a solely geographically devised boundary (e.g. all communities within a one-hour drive of SVMC's hospital campus). SVMC's service area as defined by this process has remained consistent since 2019.

Advances in technology and the availability of on-demand at-home telehealth services has started to alter the boundaries and conception of SVMC's service area. In light of these changes, the definition of SVMC's service area will likely need to be reconsidered in future assessments.

Health Data

A master list of quantitative health indicators was developed using a range of resources, including:

- Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS)
- Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS)
- County Health Rankings Reports
- Community Commons Reports
- US Census Data
- State Health Department Reports

Indicators of population demographics, access to health services, health behaviors, disease prevalence, and health status were gathered. Comparative data sets were developed to illustrate disparities between county averages, state, and national averages. Data at the county and state level was not always available, primarily for New York and Massachusetts, as data was typically only reported at the regional level. See Appendix A for health data.

Community Feedback

In an effort to gather input from a diversity of individuals in an unobtrusive, confidential, and convenient way, SVMC designed digital surveys to be completed by community members. Questions were wide-ranging and were intended to gather perceptions of health status, barriers to health care, clinical care experiences, and opinions relating to community health improvement.

Three unique surveys were conducted.

- A community-wide survey
- A youth survey
- A leadership scan

Along with a conversation with SVMC's Nursing Council, these surveys captured current health needs in the community and feedback on the drivers behind recurring priority health needs that had been identified in the CHNAs of 2015, 2018, and 2021. See Appendix B for survey advertisements.

Community-wide Survey

Respondents were asked to report life challenges and challenges they experienced with accessing healthcare in the past year, with answers collected on a Likert scale ranging from "no challenge" to "a major challenge" or multiple-choice answers. A write-in question was provided for respondents to indicate the one thing they would change about their health. The survey also collected demographic information such as zip code,

race, educational attainment, and employment status. See Appendix C for the community-wide survey.

The community-wide survey was posted and advertised on SVMC's website and social media. Digital and physical copies were distributed to community partners in an attempt to reach the medically underserved and vulnerable of SVMC's service area. The survey was also made available in Dari and Spanish, to reduce language barriers.

All versions of the survey were hosted on SVMC's institutional SurveyMonkey account.

Youth Survey

A 5-question survey aimed at capturing the youth voice was adapted from the community-wide survey, and followed a similar format. Youth respondents were asked about life challenges and personal health behaviors. Answers were collected through a Likert scale ranging from "no challenge" to "a major challenge".

Unlike the community-wide survey, youth were not asked to report zip code but were asked to report their age. See Appendix D for full youth survey.

The survey was distributed directly to students at Mt. Anthony Union High School and other area high schools, and at Alliance for Community Transformation (ACT) Bennington events. The survey was hosted through Google Forms.

Leadership Scan and Nursing Council

In an attempt to understand the drivers behind the priority health needs reported by three consecutive CHNAs, a short scan was distributed to community leaders and SVMC's nursing council. Based on the table below, both groups were asked to provide the top 3 drivers behind the identified health needs, in an open-ended write-in question.

Community leaders were also asked to provide insight into how SVMC could directly target these drivers, again in an open-ended question. The leadership scan was not made available to the public, and invitations to participate were sent directly to community leaders and those who had participated in 2021's leadership forums.

In addition to the surveys hosted by SVMC, insights from

- United Counseling Service's (UCS) 2024 Community Needs Assessment (CNA)
- Feedback collected by the Town of Bennington for comments on the future town plan

were utilized to corroborate SVMC's findings.

Survey Advertisement

Of critical importance was ensuring responses from a representative sample of SVMC's service area, particularly vulnerable and marginalized populations. Multiple means were leveraged for encouraging completion of the survey, including:

- Frequent posts on SVMC's official social media pages
- Advertisement on SVMC's website landing page
- Inclusion of the survey link in SVMC's weekly health e-newsletter, sent to a large portion of SVMC's service area via email
- Sharing of the survey information with community partners and collaborators, particularly those assisting typically underserved marginalized populations and new Americans
- Flyers displayed in waiting areas of SVMC

Collection and Analysis of Survey Responses

Due to the sensitive nature of some of the questions, responses were collected anonymously.

Survey responses were collected from February-April 2024. A total of 632 individuals responded to the community survey, either digitally or through an available physical copy. Almost all respondents answered every question, including optional write-ins.

Open-responses were thematically coded by the AmeriCorps VISTA Fellow. The coding schema and coded responses were shared with CHNA contributing authors to ensure accuracy, impartiality, and consistency of coding and categorization across questions.

Survey Limitations


As with any data, survey responses should be interpreted in the context of other data, and in consideration of the following limitations:

- Respondents needed to have access to the Internet and smartphone or computer OR have access to physical copies of the survey
- Questions were personal in nature and may have been difficult for respondents to answer truthfully, though every effort was made to ensure respondents were aware of the anonymity of their responses
- Despite best efforts, respondents did not precisely mirror the demographics of SVMC's service area: responses were weighted towards retirees, those with advanced degrees, and whites

 Respondents to the survey constituted a convenience sample, not random sample, which means that the results may not fully represent all residents within SVMC's service area. The sample is sufficient, however, for SVMC to be confident that the major themes in the data area likely hold true for the community at large.


Community Health Needs

This assessment sought to identify and quantify the health needs facing the residents of SVMC's service area. While "health" is frequently conceptualized relative to medical care, the determinants of one's health are multifaceted and extend far beyond the walls of a hospital. Research consistently indicates that clinical care constitutes between 10% and 20% of the determinants of quality and length of life. The graphic below, adapted from the County Health Rankings model, illustrates the other factors that play an integral role in influencing health outcomes.³



While the diagram indicates the portion of one's health that can be determined by each domain, it does not illustrate the inextricable links and bi-directional interplay between each domain.

To demonstrate these linkages, SVMC has created a visual framework by which health outcomes can be understood as a result of varying factors, which are ultimately underpinned by economic environment and one's ability to achieve or maintain financial stability. Financial stability enables (but does not guarantee) an individual's ability to live in a safe physical environment, to exist within a supportive community, access high-quality education from early childhood through advanced degrees, find food security and access to nutrition, and to access health care for preventative care and emergency procedures. These pillars, the social determinants of health, influence the ability to achieve and maintain good health, with the weight of each pillar's influence and interplay changing based on an individual's background and current status. This essential framework and understanding of the interconnected nature of health, economic environment, and other societal factors will be used to guide the strategies and programs laid out by the implementation plan.

Results

Mental Health, Substance Use Disorder, Healthy Behaviors, and Access to Care were consistently identified as priority health needs in the three consecutive Community Health Needs Assessments conducted in 2015, 2018, and 2021. Before data collection, the 2024 Community Health Needs Assessment results were anticipated to align with the previous three assessments.

Community Wide Survey

The community-wide survey received 630 responses from 64 zip codes in Vermont, New York, and Massachusetts. 80% of responses came from 12 zip codes, reflecting the most populated areas served by SVMC.

The majority of survey respondents were healthy, highly educated, white, and older. However, enough responses from counter populations were gathered to illuminate the differences in health needs, and to highlight opportunities for SVMC to better serve the community.

The following tables display the questions and results from the community-wide survey conducted during the CHNA process.

Mental health struggles and housing costs were the most strongly felt challenges for SVMC's community. Nearly 40% of respondents reported feeling isolated or anxious most of the time, which aligns with the finding of mental health as a persistent priority health need in previous years. Paying for housing and utilities was identified as a challenge by 26% of people, and when combined with the 13% of people who indicated they struggled with having enough food, suggests that those within SVMC's service area struggle to afford basic essentials. Alcohol and substance use continue to be identified as problems within the community, as 8% and 4% of people respectively indicate struggling with these conditions.

Barriers to Care:

Over half of survey respondents (56%) indicated that they had faced one or more barriers to accessing health care in the past year. Overwhelmingly, people struggled with accessing care in a timely manner. Of those who faced barriers to care, 61% reported being unable to get a medical appointment as soon as needed. In addition to limited appointment availability, cost of care (28%), issues with transportation to care (23%), and inability to find a doctor who accepted the respondent's insurance (14%) posed heightened barriers.

In any population, some groups may experience more challenges than others. To see if any of the challenges reported by survey respondents were limited to or disproportionately impact one population group, an analysis was performed using the comparison groups displayed in Table 3.

A. General Health

Those with Fair-Poor health struggled at a higher rate across all indicated barriers than those with Excellent-Very Good-Good health. While both health groups indicated the cost of care prevented them from accessing care, those with Fair-Poor health faced greater financial constraints, especially when viewed in tandem with the percentage of that same health group that lacked insurance coverage. Only 5% of the Excellent-Very Good-Good health group indicated that a lack of insurance coverage was a barrier of care, as opposed to 14% of those with Fair-Poor health. Both groups struggled about the same with the ability to get to a doctor (12% vs 16%), though the percentage was still higher among those with Fair-Poor health.

While respondents struggled with barriers to health care regardless of health status, care is much more difficult to access for those who need it most.

B. Educational Attainment

Regardless of educational attainment, getting an appointment remained a major challenge to receiving health care. Educational attainment had little impact on the ability to get to a doctor or on obtaining insurance coverage. However, a clear difference is evident between educational groups when it comes to the cost of care. While 13% of respondents with a Bachelor's degree or higher indicated that the cost of care prevented them from seeking care, 22% of those with lower educational attainment indicated cost was a barrier to care. Higher educational attainment correlates with higher wages, and could explain the difference between the two groups. However, the fact that cost of care remained a barrier regardless of educational attainment demonstrates that cost of care remains a significant barrier to care for almost everyone within our community.

C. Race

While cost of care remained an issue for all survey respondents, racial minorities faced a higher cost burden compared to white residents. Only 2% of survey respondents identified as non-white, yet 25% of non-white respondents indicated that the cost of care posed a barrier to accessing health care, as compared to 16% of white respondents struggle with cost.

A higher number of white respondents (35%) indicated that they struggled to get an appointment, compared to 25% of non-white respondents. Transportation to a doctor was an issue for 13% of white, compared to 8% of non-white respondents. The difference between white and non-white respondents may reflect differences in expectations.

The inability to both get an appointment and get to a doctor remained clear barriers to care in SVMC's service area, regardless of racial group.

There was nearly a 20% difference between those with Medicare (27%) and those with private insurance (43%) in the struggle to get an appointment, with Medicare patients facing less of an obstacle. The trend of lower burden for Medicare patients continued when looking at cost of care, transportation to the doctor, and lack of insurance coverage.

These heightened differences between the experiences and perceptions of Medicare patients and those with private insurance could be explained by differences in circumstance. Medicare patients who responded to the survey were almost exclusively retired, whereas the majority of those with private insurance got their coverage through their employment, or a family member's employment. It is possible that the typical day/time offerings of medical appointments do not align with the availability of full-time workers with private insurance, who would be forced to navigate workloads and make use of limited time-off in order to attend appointments. Retired Medicare patients would not be constrained by the same scheduling issues.

Qualitative Results

The ability to get a timely appointment, the cost of care, ability to easily get to a doctor, and level of insurance coverage all posed major barriers for patients in SVMC's service area. This data was further supported by comments and write-in answers submitted as part of the community-wide survey. When asked to indicate what, if any, reasons prevented respondents from accessing health care within the last year, respondents were given an 'other' option, in which they could write in an additional answer not provided.

The majority of these write-in answers focused on long wait times for appointments and the lack of specialty providers in the region. Multiple comments described having to wait 6 months or more to be seen or being unable to find a doctor accepting new patients at all. Lack of dental providers was specifically pointed out by many respondents. Many people reported having to travel outside of SVMC's service area for specialty care. In addition to concerns regarding access, other answers mentioned concerns around high cost, negative personal experiences at SVMC, or fear of receiving low-quality care based on weight or other physical characteristics.

Youth Survey

The youth-focused survey received 146 responses from children aged 13-18. Respondents were asked to identify how much of a personal challenge they had in the past year with the issues below:

Youth in SVMC's service area struggle with mental health at a concerning frequency. Of youth respondents, 67% struggled with worry, anxiety, or fear, and 45% of respondents struggled with depression. Both adults and youth reported struggling immensely with mental health. However, the rate reported by young people was higher than that of adults, suggesting that youth are facing unique stressors that are negatively impacting their mental health.

Mental health struggles are not the only challenges faced by area youth. A quarter of respondents reported that they struggled with feeling safe in their neighborhood (25%) and with having enough food (24%). Substance use (12%) and alcohol (6%) presented challenges as well, signaling the need for increased programming and support directed at youth.

An analysis similar to that performed with the community-wide survey data was performed on the youth-specific data, measuring level of general health and race against each of the identified challenges.

As in the community-wide survey, the majority of respondents (86%) categorized their health as Excellent, Very Good, or Good, while 14% categorized their health as Poor or Fair. The youth survey had a higher percentage of non-white respondents than the community-wide survey. Likely due to changing demographics across the state, 16% of youth respondents identified as non-white, while 79% identified as white.

Regardless of general health, mental health struggles remained prevalent for youth. Of respondents with Excellent, Very Good, or Good health, 73% reported experiencing challenges with worry, anxiety, or fear, compared to 57% of those with Fair or Poor health. Those with Fair or Poor health faced more of a challenge with depression when compared to those with Excellent, Very Good, or Good health.

Of those with Fair or Poor health, 23% reported struggling with feeling safe in their neighborhood, and 27% of the same health group struggled with having enough food. Youth with Fair or Poor health struggled more with substance use (17%) when compared to those with Excellent, Very Good, or Good health (11%). In line with this trend, 13% of those with Fair or Poor health struggled with alcohol, compared to 5% of those with Excellent, Very Good, or Good health.

While there were some distinct differences between health groups, namely in challenges with worry, anxiety, or fear and alcohol use, youth struggle with the above challenges regardless of health status, suggesting that these are widespread challenges for youth within the community.

Struggles with mental health remained prevalent, regardless of race. Of white respondents, 73% reported experiencing challenges with worry, anxiety, or fear,

compared to 57% of non-white respondents. Non-white respondents had more of a challenge with depression when compared to white respondents.

Of non-white respondents, 23% reported struggling with feeling safe in their neighborhood, and 27% of the same racial group struggled with having enough food. Struggles with substance use were more commonly reported by non-white respondents (17%) compared to 11% of white respondents. Struggles with alcohol followed this pattern, with 13% of non-white respondents struggling with alcohol compared to 5% of white respondents.

While there were some distinct differences between racial groups, namely in challenges with worry, anxiety, or fear and alcohol use, youth struggled with the above challenges regardless of race, suggesting that these are widespread challenges for youth within the community.

Community Leaders and Nursing Scan

In order to go beyond identification of the 2024 priority health needs of SVMC's service area to understand the drivers of health needs, a survey of community leaders and a conversation with SVMC nurses was held, resulting in 35 survey responses and feedback from 11 SVMC nurses. Both groups were asked to submit what they understood to be the three primary drivers behind the priority health needs found in 2015, 2018, and 2021.

The drivers identified by community leaders aligned closely with the current challenges reported by both community-wide survey respondents and youth-specific respondents. Access to care was identified overwhelmingly as the greatest barrier to care by community respondents, and 25% of leadership responses identified access to care as a driver of previously found priority health needs. This was supported by the discussion with SVMC nurses, many of whom pointed out the difficulty in getting primary/specialty

care and mental health care. SVMC nurses specifically called out the lack of providers, and long wait times for appointments.

Substance use and mental health issues were identified as a driver of priority health needs by 22% of leaders, and the community-wide and youth-specific surveys both indicate that mental health issues continue to be pervasive. The lack of mental health providers in the region was consistently pointed to as a cause of continuing mental health struggles. Connections between poor mental health and increasing rates of substance use were made to self-medication through recreational drug and alcohol use. Nurses identified self-medication as an especially acute problem for young people who struggled to find community activities and support.

Economic constraints were identified as a driver of previously determined priority health needs by 17% of leadership responses, and 9% specifically identified the cost of housing. The cost of medical care, housing, and food were all identified as challenges in both the community-wide survey and the youth-survey, indicating that economic struggles persist on multiple fronts and underpin health and health care access. Comments from nurses also supported the idea that economic challenges underlie the priority health needs, with many pointing to the lack of stable and secure housing.

Additional Data

Where available, county, state and national level data for SVMC's service area was collected to compare the findings from the surveys conducted as part of the CHNA process. Data collected for Bennington County, Rutland County, Windham County VT, Rensselaer County and Washington County NY, and Berkshire County MA is displayed in Appendix A. In addition to county level data, quantitative and qualitative data from the Community Needs Assessment (CNA) conducted by United Counseling Service of Bennington County (UCS), and community responses to the Bennington Town Plan update process was utilized.

Mental health was a key challenge for both adults and youth in SVMC's service area, and additional county and state level data confirmed the severity of this problem.

Wherever additional data was available, it confirmed the trend found by SVMC's surveys: that youth mental health in the region presents a serious challenge. In each available county and outside source, the percent of youth who reported struggling with their mental health was at least 20% higher than the percent of adults who reported mental health struggles. To advance a healthy and thriving community, SVMC must work to address the adverse symptoms of poor mental health experienced by people of all ages, particularly the youth.

Access to care remained a consistent problem for people within SVMC's service area, a problem that was corroborated by measurement of patient-doctor per capita ratios.

In addition to the patient-doctor ratios and concerns regarding access to care raised in the SVMC survey, the UCS CNA and comments on the Bennington Town Plan spotlighted challenges accessing care. Community members reaffirmed that the lack of providers and limited availability of appointments pose a high-level challenge to

accessing care, and town respondents characterized access to care as a major struggle for the town.

Cost of Living Crisis

The divide between income and cost of living continues to grow. According to recent data, 15.4% of people in Bennington County are considered to be in poverty, as compared to the state rate of 11.5% of people. A higher rate of poverty exists in youth—16.6% of people under the age of 18 in Bennington County are considered to be in poverty.

Bennington county's median income is \$68,558, falling short of VT's state measure of \$73,991. As prices continue to rise across the state, the disconnect between cost of living and income will continue to grow. For the 11% of Bennington County residents in poverty, this disconnect has an even stronger and harsher impact on their families' ability to thrive. Those who make enough to survive but not thrive may be faced with tough financial decisions, especially deferring high cost health care services.

Evidence of the economic hardship brought by the gap between actual income and the annual income needed to live comfortably is further supported by the Social Vulnerability Index scores of SVMC's service area and by community responses to the CHNA survey.

Measured by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry, the Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) measures the demographic and socio-economic factors that adversely affect communities and the stressors they face. Counties are then ranked on a score of 0.0 (least variability) to 1.0 (most vulnerability). The 16 US census variables used to calculate the SVI score are shown below:

Bennington County has an SVI score of 1.0, placing it at the highest level of social vulnerability among Vermont's other counties. Bennington's neighboring counties, including Windham and Rutland, also have scores indicating high levels of social vulnerability, of 0.7 and 0.8 respectively.

Bennington has a large population of 65+ residents, an unemployment rate of 3.1% as of April 2024, high housing costs and access to transportation are significant challenges to residents within SVMC's service area, all measures that contribute to a county's SVI score. Of SVMC survey respondents, 26% said they struggled with paying for housing in the past year, 13% struggled with having enough food, and 16% struggled with transportation (*Table 1*).

Lack of affordable housing has led to an increasing number of people experiencing housing instability and homelessness. Food insecurity is on the rise due to increasing costs and stagnant wages.⁶ In addition to the financial burden of life essentials, residents also struggled greatly with accessibility and cost of care.

Residents in SVMC's service area struggle with the financial requirements of life across multiple dimensions, many of which intersect or constrain access to other dimensions.

In order to effectively address the priority health needs, SVMC should consider approaches to address the growing gap between income and cost of living.

Conclusion

While the time taken to complete the assessment process has been imperative to create a community-driven and realistic framework for improving the community's health, rapid action is also needed to reduce human suffering and loss of life to mental health conditions. suicide, substance use disorder, overdose, and chronic illness. In the coming three years, SVMC will seek to address the priority health needs by carrying out both



short-term programming with immediate impact while initiating long-term initiatives, the true effects of which will not be measurable for years or decades. Providing quick assistance where it is most needed while setting into motion actions with longer lead times that will create a brighter future, is a balance at the core of all community health programming.

The 2024 CHNA process underscored multiple complex challenges facing the residents in SVMC's service area. As in the past years, mental health, substance use disorder, and access to care were found to be major issues in SVMC's community. 2024's CHNA went beyond the results of previous years, building off of past findings to interrogate the drivers behind recurrent priority health needs.

Each identified priority health need warrants a careful use of dedicated resources to affect positive change, with a watchful eye upon metrics that will indicate impact.

While the purpose of the CHNA is to identify community needs, the approach also highlighted the resiliency of the region. The communities served by SVMC have the strength and passion to meet the identified priority health needs. SVMC is prepared to work alongside individuals and community organizations that are aligned in the mission to deliver healthy lives for everyone.

Implementation Strategy

To maintain its status as a non-profit hospital, SVMC is required by Section 501(r)(3)(A) of the Internal Revenue Code to produce an implementation strategy outlining planned initiatives to address the priority health needs identified by the CHNA.


As both a community hospital and the largest employer in Bennington County, SVMC is in a unique position to address the health needs of its community, beyond the treatment of physical health and disease. This comprehensive implementation strategy addresses both programming and policy barriers, and leverages a vast network of community partnerships and collaboration. As an actively evolving plan, specific initiatives will be accelerated, adapted, or not pursued based upon effectiveness, budgetary constraints, and changing partnerships.

Nearly all of the strategies listed will impact multiple health priorities, both directly and indirectly. In the following tables, initiatives have been divided between clinical efforts and community-based initiatives. A checkmark in the corresponding row indicates the priority health need(s) that each strategy will impact.

Each strategy is aligned with at least one of the areas outlined in SVMC's framework for organizing community health initiatives. The color of the corresponding portion of the framework is displayed next to the strategy, depicting the multifaceted impacts expected from each strategy.

An asterisk indicates that a program or initiative has been adopted by another Dartmouth Health partner.

SVMC alone cannot address these priority health needs and improve community health. The key to achieving success will be SVMC's continuing collaboration with local organizations and municipalities and the community. The health of the communities served by SVMC will improve with deployment of the multi-year programmatic and policy initiatives. Although SVMC and partners may act promptly, it will take decades for outcomes to be fully realized. The implementation plan represents initial steps in a journey to improve systemic issues that will yield durable impact rather than create quick fixes that would yield non-durable results.

SVMC has created a visual framework by which health outcomes can be understood as a result of varying factors, which are ultimately underpinned by economic environment and one's ability to achieve or maintain financial stability. Financial stability enables (but does not guarantee) an individual's ability to live in a safe physical environment, to exist within a supportive community, access high-quality education from early childhood through advanced degrees, find food security and access to nutrition, and to access health care for preventative care and emergency procedures. These pillars, the social

determinants of health, influence the ability to achieve and maintain good health, with the weight of each pillar's influence and interplay changing based on an individual's background and current status. This essential framework and understanding of the interconnected nature of health, economic environment, and other societal factors will be used to guide the strategies and programs laid out by the implementation plan.

The Healthy Community visual framework demonstrates the connections between economic environment, personal economic stability, and health outcomes. Financial stability enables (but does not guarantee) an individual's ability to live in a safe physical environment, to exist within a supportive community, access high-quality education from early childhood through advanced degrees, find food security and access to nutrition, and to access health care for preventative care and emergency procedures. These factors, displayed in the pillars above, are the social determinants of health. The weight of each factor's influence and interplay with the others changes based on an individual's background and their current status.

Using the color-key, each implementation strategy has been organized along the corresponding portion(s) of the framework, showcasing the multifaceted impacts expected to come from each strategy.

SVMC is taking additional steps to increase access to care. SVMC's 2024 Medical Staff Development Plan identified the need for recruitment of 18 primary care providers during the next 5 years, bolstering the capacity of the 29 primary care providers already serving SVMC's service area. In addition, 15 specialty providers need to be recruited. Increasing provider numbers will reduce wait times and increase availability.

In addition to the proposed recruitment numbers outlined in the Medical Staff Development Plan and the proposed initiatives in the Implementation Strategy, SVMC is held to the requirements of Section 2 of Act 167 (2022). Section 2 requires that the Green Mountain Care Board (GMCB), in collaboration with the Director of Health Care Reform in the Agency of Human Services, "develop and conduct a data-informed, patient-focused, community-inclusive engagement process for Vermont's hospitals to":

- Reduce inefficiencies
- Lower costs
- Improve population health outcomes
- Reduce health inequities
- Increase access to essential services
- · And maintain sufficient capacity for emergency management

These regulatory requirements will support SVMC in its efforts to address the priority health needs identified by the 2024 CHNA. Through a combination of clinical and community initiatives SVMC is well positioned to create positive change for the community it serves.
