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

In 2024, our Kendall Emergency Department received the prestigious Emergency Nurses Association's 2024 Lantern Award® for excellence. The department was one of just 91 across the country, and the only one in Vermont, to earn this honor.

Behind every accolade, accomplishment, and step forward, are the daily efforts of our clinical teams and support staff as well as the countless contributions from our volunteer leaders, including our Board of Trustees, Foundation Board, Regional Advisory Boards, and generous donors in our community. # From Collaboration to Integration

The culmination of more than a decade of collaboration, Southwestern Vermont Medical Center officially became the sixth member hospital in the Dartmouth Health system on July 1, 2023. As noted by Thomas Dee, CEO and President of SVMC, the formalized integration and affiliation is "an important step in sustaining efficient, high-quality care for the communities we serve."

In addition to allowing for the sharing of resources, such as state-of-the-art technology and the latest in clinical research, the integration gives SVMC patients access to more than 2,000 of Dartmouth Health's most distinguished physicians and providers as well as specialty care, including cancer treatments and trials, orthopedics, and heart and vascular care.

Citing the challenges faced by rural health systems across the country, Joanne M. Conroy, MD, CEO and President of Dartmouth Health said, "We know we can't solve these problems alone, but working together we are stronger. Our partnership with SVMC will serve to fortify our critical healthcare institutions against the fluctuating challenges of the market." # Expanding to meet the needs of the communities we serve

One of the most exciting benefits of becoming a member of Dartmouth Health is the opportunity to establish SVMC as a regional referral hospital.

SVMC is in a position to accept patients from outside of our service area when other hospitals are at capacity or do not have the services provided at SVMC.

According to Trey Dobson, MD, chief medical officer for SVMC, "We're actively expanding existing services and creating new ones to meet the needs of the communities we serve. In 2023, around 6,000 patients in our catchment area had to travel to other facilities for care. By leveraging the resources of the Dartmouth Health system, we anticipate increasing our patient base from 75,000 to 125,000 while continuing to fulfill our mission of providing exceptional care."

# Expanded Services

# Keeping care closer to home

SVMC is now a member of Dartmouth Health and will expand local services to meet the needs of patients, enhance physician recruitment, and contribute to the organization's financial stability.

**Oncology:** all-new facility, access to clinical trials, expanded services (see p. 32)

**Orthopedics:** expanded subspecialties, creation of comprehensive services (see p. 9)

**Cardiovascular:** new technology and vascular procedures

**Primary Care:** establish a new primary care practice on the hospital campus in Bennington (see p.10)

**Mental Health:** SVMC submitted a proposal for a state-supported inpatient adolescent psychiatric unit for regulatory approvals. The proposal was approved in March 2025.

Other ways joining the Dartmouth Health system is contributing to our ability to attract and keep patients at SVMC include:

- the addition of several pieces of new technology, including robotic surgery and a cardiac CT
- access to clinical trials
- · access to specialty services

In addition to elevating the level of care offered, these benefits strengthen our ongoing efforts to recruit top-tier talent across many disciplines.

# Leveraging technology for better outcomes

Southwestern Vermont Medical Center's integration with Dartmouth Health provides the opportunity to bring more state-of-the-art technology to the orthopedics practice, specifically, robotic surgery. This investment was also bolstered by philanthropic support in FY23.

The new technology is used for total joint replacements and offers an unparalleled level of precision during surgery. SVMC surgeons work closely with the teams at Dartmouth to establish the highest level of standards to ensure the best outcomes.

According to Director of Perioperative Services Joanna Callis, the orthopedics and other surgical departments are also adjusting how surgeries are scheduled based on the proven approach used at Dartmouth Health. "With the number of orthopedic surgeries climbing, we needed to figure out how to maximize available time quickly and efficiently in the OR. As part of Dartmouth Health, we got a front row seat to best practices and were able to not just make strides but leaps toward improving what we do."

#### Sharing protocols and creating standards

While many aspects of the integration are more visible in the form of new logos and equipment, some of the most important benefits take place behind the scenes. Shortly after the integration took place, SVMC's perioperative team began joining quarterly meetings with perioperative teams from the five other hospitals in the Dartmouth Health system.

Joanna Callis, director of perioperative services at SVMC, says, "These meetings are incredibly helpful to all involved. They allow us to share each organization's clinical protocol, and to create standardization across the system. Standardization is especially important when it comes to measuring different aspects of care and outcomes. When we're standardized, we can meaningfully compare practices and outcomes and set protocol standards that reflect best practices."

One department that's already implemented changes based on information gained from integration is orthopedics.

Callis says, "Between 2020 and 2023 the volume of orthopedic cases grew by nearly 40 percent. Obviously, this has a big impact on how the practice operates and procedures are completed. For example, when your case volume jumps by 40 percent so does the amount of sterile processing of instruments and the time it takes for doctors to complete that processing.

"Thanks to the relationship with Dartmouth Health, we were able to learn from and adopt some of the practices that enable them to manage high patient volumes in in the orthopedic department."

# A new approach to address the health workforce shortage

The primary care provider shortage is a nationwide problem and is contributing to ever-increasing healthcare costs and delays in patient care.

SVMC is doing its part to reverse these trends by actively recruiting providers for all its primary care sites. Plans are also in the works to create an expanded primary care site in the medical office building on the SVMC campus.

This expanded practice will create a collaborative environment where highly qualified providers, who have completed their residency, work alongside seasoned physicians to gain valuable clinical experience. The program attracts new talent, which, in turn, increases patient access to care. SVMC will be the future site of a Dartmouth-Hitchcock Family Medicine Residency program.

# New program expedites care and keeps patients close to home

For those living with chronic and acute pain in communities served by SVMC, 2023 was a year that brought relief in many forms.

Thanks to the new Interventional Pain Clinic, patients no longer need to wait four to six months for an appointment or drive hundreds of miles to get essential treatment.

Pamela Duchene, PhD, APRN, vice president of patient care services and chief nursing and quality officer, explained how the pain clinic team grew in exciting ways in 2023.

"We were thrilled to have Dr. Andrew Shedden, an interventional neuroradiologist, and Dr. Joshua Tobe, an anesthesiologist with a focus in pain management, create a formalized pain clinic," says Duchene.

Located on the hospital campus, the clinic provides personalized care for up to 30 patients a week. Darcy Main, RN, CRNI, VA-BC, takes the lead on the majority of cases.

"Many of the people we see have been living with chronic and acute conditions, including migraines, spinal stenosis, joint issues, and more," says Main. "For them, the notion of driving many miles multiple times for treatment is simply unrealistic. We're now able to offer them consults and a range of treatment options, all close to home."

"We follow up with every patient after treatment to learn how they're feeling and to schedule timely appointments to make any necessary adjustments." She adds, "Honestly, there's nothing more rewarding than having a grateful patient share that, thanks to treatment, they've walked farther in the last day than they have in months or even years."

In addition to local patients, the clinic is receiving referrals from Dartmouth Health's Center for Pain and Spine.

"The integration with Dartmouth Health, along with the expanded services and access, is already making a difference across the entire system," says Duchene. "But most importantly, it's giving people a quality of life they've been missing."

With patient numbers and queries climbing, the clinic is already planning to expand its space and access in the next year.

# Integration and innovation boost vascular services

The integration with Dartmouth Health is allowing SVMC to expand vascular services in meaningful ways.

Rather than have patients travel more than an hour for state-of-the-art cardiac diagnostics and surgery, SVMC is working to provide a full spectrum of vascular care in the near future.

Thanks to generous philanthropic support from Don and Nancy Kendall, the SVMC Cardiology team is working with their colleagues at Dartmouth Health on the acquisition of new cardiac CT technology. A cardiac computed tomography (CT) scan uses many X-rays from different angles to construct images of the heart using a scanner and computer. This quick but detailed and high-resolution scan shows a healthcare provider problems with your heart structure, valves, arteries, aorta, and more.


According to SVMC's Medical Director of Cardiology Scott Rogge, "This new technology will be a huge boost to our diagnostic capabilities. Currently we rely on stress tests and other measures to assess what's happening within a patient. But a cardiac CT will give us a real-time look at what's occurring and enables us to provide better-informed treatment plans."

Rogge notes that once acquired, images produced by the CT will be remotely read by cardiologists at Dartmouth Health. "This allows us to fully utilize the technology to the benefit of our patients immediately while the Bennington-based team participates in essential training."

SVMC will also have a vascular surgeon from Dartmouth Health's Heart and Vascular Center at the hospital on a weekly basis, with the goal of providing vascular surgery in the future. This creates a cleaner, less cumbersome path to care and contributes to a stronger SVMC-physician and patient relationship.

Another anticipated benefit of the integration to SVMC's cardiology program is improved physician recruitment. "The partnership with Dartmouth Health and the addition of state-of-the-art technology serves to differentiate SVMC from other cardiac programs in very meaningful ways. It's an exciting time for patients and providers."

# **Transitional Nursing**

# A compassionate approach cuts readmissions by 50-plus percent

Living with a chronic illness can feel like an endless cycle of trips to the doctor's office or emergency room. It's exhausting, discouraging, disruptive, and expensive. But, as SVMC's Transitional Care program proves, it's not always necessary.

According to Lauren Cinelli, BSNRN, director of health resource management at SVMC, the Transitional Care program has cut hospital readmissions by 50

to 55 percent. "As impressive as a big number like that is," she says, "it's really just a reflection of the difference small things can make."

Staffed with two full-time and two per diem nurses, the program deploys nurses into the community to provide an average of three months of follow-up care to people who have been discharged from the hospital on an in- or out-patient basis as well as individuals who have been referred to them.

"We get referrals from primary care doctors, various agencies and organizations in the community, and even friends and family members," says transitional care nurse Jennifer Harrington, MSN, RN. "Much of what we do is education. Sometimes it's clearing up confusion about discharge instructions, helping them use a piece of medical equipment for the first time, creating a medication schedule, or recognizing the signs that something's not right with their recovery and working to correct it before it becomes hospital-worthy."

The nurses also work to create an open line of communication between the hospital, primary care doctors, and members of the hospital's community care team, which includes social workers and health advocates. "We're very focused on raising awareness of the services we provide and that they're free," say Cinelli. "The more potential sources we can engage with, the more people we can help get back to living full and meaningful lives."

# Telemetry

# Continous monitoring contributes to better outcomes

Staying on top of the moment-to-moment status of SVMC's most critical and vulnerable patients is non-negotiable. Thanks to a recently upgraded and expanded centralized telemetry program, with a direct link to Dartmouth Health, more patients than ever are benefiting from the continuous monitoring the technology provides.

According to SVMC Lead Telemetry Technician Jessica Rice, LNA, "Located in the center of ICU [intensive care unit], centralized telemetry is staffed 24/7 by trained telemetry technicians. Telemetry provides us with real-time data about patient's cardiac rhythms, blood oxygen levels, and other important clinical data. With the expanded program, we're now able to monitor patients in multiple departments and units. Telemetry reviews the data and initiates rapid interventions when necessary. Continuously staffed monitoring is a valuable resource for the care team as it reduces response times, workflow interruptions, and contributes to better patient outcomes."

Another advantage of the upgraded system is the connection with TeleICU providers at Dartmouth Health, who can access the current and historical data on ICU patients. This long-distance insight allows them to collaborate on care decisions with SVMC providers in real-time for the best possible patient outcomes.

# Daily Safety Huddle

# Leaders working to preserve a high level of safety and quality care

Every day at SVMC begins with creating a culture of patient safety.

More than 20 organization leaders, including department directors and executive team members, participate in a daily safety huddle that is held at 8:30 a.m. every morning.

One of the hallmarks of a high-reliability organization, safety huddles keep frontline staff and leadership aware of emerging situations. Typically lasting 10 to 15 minutes, safety huddles are where unexpected events and issues that occurred in the last 24 hours are shared and potential causes of disruption or challenges to providing care are identified.

"Safety huddles are critical to preserving a high level of safety and quality," says Kim Webster, RN, SVMC patient advocate. "The biggest benefit is the shared awareness they create among senior and operational leaders of what's happening on the front lines and across the organization. In addition, they allow us to identify safety events and unsafe conditions that require resolution and/or follow-up, and they establish clear lines of responsibility as to who is accountable for addressing patient and staff safety concerns."

Because representatives from each department are present, multiple perspectives and experiences can be harnessed to problem-solve issues and to identify the appropriate resources to correct issues.

"The goal," says Webster, "is to address problems and work to resolve them before they evolve into something of major consequence."

# Interdisciplinary Rounding

# Better outcomes through consistent communication

For health care professionals, no two days and no two patients are ever alike. With issues ranging from routine to life threatening, it's critically important for medical staff to stay on top of each patient's status and informed of the plan for their care and eventual discharge.

According to Laur E. Grande MSN, RN, the director of medical surgical nursing services at SVMC, "Without a doubt, communication is a critical component of quality health care, which is why we begin every day with interdisciplinary rounding. Regular, consistent communication keeps everyone on the same page and ensures a better patient experience and outcomes."

Held every weekday morning, interdisciplinary rounding brings together each patient's physician and nurse responsible for their care as well as the house supervisor, and representatives from respiratory, physical therapy, case management, pharmacy, and social services teams.

Beginning in the ICU and moving together to each med-surg unit, the group reviews the status of each patient, including how they fared overnight, the care plan for the day, any concerns or barriers related to discharge, and which resources they may need upon discharge.

"Because all the departments are part of the discussion," says Grande, "they can prepare for what's required of their team to ensure a smooth patient experience. It allows us to be proactive rather than reactive. Plus, because we're all on the same page, any communication with the patient or their family about the care plan is clear and consistent, which is tremendously comforting for all."





# Vision 2020

#### Major milestones achieved

A major highlight of 2024 was the completion of a three-year renovation and construction project that modernized and expanded the Kendell Emergency Department, and the construction of a new front entrance, including the Richard and Pamela Ader Foundation Lobby, the Jackie and Tony Marro Café, and the Stout Thomson Waiting Area and Outpatient Registration.

Made possible by dollars raised by SVHC's Foundation's Vision 2020: A Decade of Transformation capital campaign, the \$31 million project was critical to addressing the needs of a growing patient base and the staff who care for them.

The biggest challenge throughout the project was creating new space and renovating existing space, all while keeping the adjacent emergency department fully functional. Because of the complexity of the effort, including modernizing essential systems such as plumbing, electrical, and nurse call, it was necessary to maintain two active emergency departments while critical transitions were being made.

Key milestones of the project included:

- June 2023: The opening of the Emergency Crisis Area, a 5-bed area with private rooms outfitted with de-escalation tools, including windows and interactive technology.
- July 2023: The partial completion of ED clinical spaces, including 8 exam rooms
- October 2023: The opening of the Kendall Emergency Department waiting area, the Richard and Pamela Ader Foundation Lobby, and the Jackie and Tony Marro Café.
- August 2024: The completion of Kendell ED renovations, for a total of 18 treatment spaces and additional staff areas, opening of Stout Thomson Waiting Area and Outpatient Registration.

# Vision 2020: Phase One Complete

#### Enhancing the care experience for all

The transformation of the emergency department, key patient areas, and front lobby will have a profound impact on the quality of care and how it's delivered for years to come.

Here's a look at just some of the key improvements that benefit patients, staff, and visitors.

#### **The Kendall Emergency Department**

- Doubled footprint to accommodate the 25,000 annual visits to the ED
- Twelve private exam rooms with individual lighting and temperature control
- Improved infection control thanks to hands-free, wave-activation door access for each of the rooms, and negative-pressure capability to stop the spread of airborne pathogens
- Four vertical treatment rooms for fast-tracking patients with low-acuity symptoms
- Two trauma rooms and four "fast-track" patient rooms
- Telehealth capability connecting each exam room to providers at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center
- A centralized nurses' station that puts nurses and providers closer to patients and allows for more timely decision-making and improved communication
- Equipment storage alcoves for improved efficiency
- A designated medication room for maximum accuracy while preparing medication
- Expanded family waiting area with state-of-the-art lighting, temperature control, and pediatric play area

#### The Richard and Pamela Ader Foundation Lobby, the Jackie and Tony Marro Café, and the Stout Thomson Waiting Area and Outpatient Registration

- An expanded patient drop-off area
- Enhanced navigation to registration, emergency services, and other essential areas
- A new café offering healthy food options, coffee, other beverages, as well as gift items, toiletries, and other essentials for patients, staff, and visitors

Part of Vision 2020: A Decade of Transformation capital campaign, the \$31 million project was primarily funded through philanthropic giving. The project included expanding and renovating the emergency department to create the new Kendall Emergency Department (ED), construction of a new front entrance, including the Richard and Pamela Ader Foundation Lobby, the Jackie and Tony Marro Café, and the Stout Thomson Waiting Area and Outpatient Registration. The renovated and new spaces were named in honor of major supporters of the campaign, many of whom attended the official SVMC ribbon cutting ceremony on Thursday, August 29, 2024, along with ED staff, local leaders, and dignitaries.

# Vision 2020: Phase Two

#### Transforming and preparing to deliver the next level of cancer care

One of the biggest transformations planned as part of Phase Two is the construction of the new Hoyt-Hunter Center for Oncology Care at the Dartmouth Cancer Center, Bennington.

Designed to meet the growing demand for exceptional regional oncology services, the all-new space is a major expansion of the existing cancer center and linear accelerator vault.

Key elements of the building design are a dedicated patient drop-off/pick-up area, as well as a docking area for the existing mobile PET CT trailer; this new PET CT access will also feature a covered canopy and a seamless, single-level entry. The new facility will also feature 11 private infusion bays, 5 all-new medical infusion chairs, private consult areas, and a dedicated space for blood draws.

Providers will benefit from an expanded pharmacy and compounding area designed to handle the increased patient volume, and a central nursing station with full view of all the infusion bays.

According to Matthew Vernon, MD, medical director and radiation oncologist, "The new facility is precisely what we need to deliver the next level of cancer care and take advantage of all that the integration with Dartmouth Health affords us. The expanded capacity means we can treat more patients locally, so they won't have to make long and difficult journeys for their care. Being part of the larger Dartmouth Cancer Center means accessing the intellectual capital of all the Dartmouth providers, as well as access to clinical trials and review of all cases with Dartmouth's team. It's an exciting time for SVMC and the patients we serve.







### Remembering Our Own

#### **RICHARD ADER**

A long-standing member of the Board of Trustees at SVMC. Richard Ader was a strong advocate for improving the quality of health care in the region. The generous support he and Pamela lent to SVMC was instrumental in



helping us meet our VISION 2020 goals and will positively impact the quality of care for decades to come.

An accomplished businessman, Richard was also committed to creating opportunities for disadvantaged children to discover their full potential. In 2016, he founded the Bennington Tennis Center and later launched Bennington ACES, a part of United States Tennis Foundation's National Junior Tennis and Learning Network. To date, more than 3,000 local children in grades 4 to 9 from 14 local schools have participated at no cost to the children or their families.

Richard was presented with the National Junior Tennis and Learning (NJTL) Founders' Service Award at the 2022 USTA Annual Meeting and Conference for a decade-long dedication to serving under-resourced youth.

Richard was the deserved recipient of the Sean L. Casey Distinguished Community Service Award by the SVMC Foundation in recognition of his tremendous and ongoing support of numerous causes and organizations in southern Vermont.

#### **DEAN HANSON**

A lifelong Vermonter, Dean Hanson carried a passion to serve from his earliest days. The longstanding owner of Hanson-Walbridge Funeral Homes, he served on the boards of numerous organizations in Bennington, including SVMC's Board of Trustees. A Trustee Emeritus for nearly 20 years, Dean was a

pioneer in establishing Bennington's first rescue squad. His concern for the well-being of others was also evident in his support of and participation in several SVMC initiatives. He was a member of the Henry Putnam Circle and was an active



member of the Regional Advisory Board until his passing. For 40 years he lent critical financial support to SVMC campaigns including the Community Health Fund, the Capital Campaign for Ambulatory Care, the Patient Resource Fund, VISION 2020, and even donned his cleats at the age of 95 to participate in the 2023 Masters in Mountains golf tournament.

#### **ROBY HARRINGTON, III**

A respected and valued member of the SVMC Foundation community, Roby Harrington was known to give generously to causes about which he cared deeply. A former chairman of the Young & Rubicam Group, he retired with his

beloved wife. Whit, to Dorset, VT and Boca Grande, FL, where his charitable efforts continued. He previously served as SVMC's **Foundation Director** and was a member of the Centennial Society. Beginning in 1991, he generously lent his



support to numerous SVMC campaigns that served to enhance and expand the quality of care offered. These include Vision 2020: A Decade of Transformation Capital Campaign, TeleHealth Endowment, the Annual Fund, the Grateful Bennington Fund, the COVID-19 Relief Fund, the emergency department, and cardiac care. He was active with many other nonprofit organizations, including serving in an advisory role during the formation of Teach for America and as an active member of the board of the Calvin Coolidge Presidential Foundation, where he served well into his 90s.

These individuals will be long remembered and deeply missed by the SVMC community.

#### **MARCUS MARTINEZ, MD**

A beloved member of the medical community, Marcus Martinez, M.D. practiced medicine with a personal touch that he learned at the side of his father, Dr. Philip Martinez, a community doctor in Hoosick Falls, NY. After earning his medical degree at Albany Medical College, he opened a practice in his hometown and later joined the SVMC Twin Rivers Medical Practice. In 2018, he was awarded SVMC's Clinical Excellence Award, which is given annually to the physician or advanced practice provider who best represents the

drive for clinical excellence. As the school physician at Hoosick Falls Central School, he played a role in the well-being of nearly every single child in the community for 19 years and refereed



countless basketball games at his local community youth center. In 2015, Marcus was thrust into the national spotlight when he and fellow Hoosick Falls resident Michael Hickey raised the alarm about in the community's water supply. Their effort was critical in the EPA's decision to designate the area a Superfund site, establish more stringent drinking water standards for PFOAs, and secure a new and safe drinking water source for the area.

#### **WILLIAM TOLD**

A resident of West Palm Beach, FL and Dorset, VT, Bill Told had an illustrious career in banking and was a generous and thoughtful benefactor to organizations that worked



to improve the quality of life for all in both communities. SVMC was fortunate to be among those organizations. Bill's commitment to SVMC included being loyal supporter the Annual Fund and the Covid-19 Relief Fund. He and his wife Jane were also champions of and major donors to the Vision 2020 emergency department project and the TeleHealth Endowment campaign. In 2023, Bill and Jane served on the Honorary Committee for The Summer Gala where they kicked off the all-important Putnam Challenge, setting a new fundraising record for that year.




